

# ENG506 Introduction to Linguistics (3 credit hours) Course Syllabus

## **Course Description**

Students will learn the basics of each linguistic sub-field: phonology, morphology, syntax, semantics, and pragmatics. Students will also explore the many types of linguistics such as historical linguistics, applied linguistics, sociolinguistics, psycholinguistics, and so on. By understanding how languages work, students will be able to more effectively compose appropriate text and help students to do the same, should they so choose.

## **Course Learning Outcomes**

By the end of this course, you will be able to:

- 1. Understand and apply the basics of phonology, morphology, syntax, semantics, and pragmatics to words and sentences.
- 2. Discuss the types of linguistics at an appropriate level for graduate studies
- 3. Create a final project using one of the types of linguistics that applies to their chosen field of study

## **Time Commitment**

Effective time management is possibly the single most critical element to your academic success. This course is designed to help you experience linguistics. Most weeks will include a writing assignments and discussion forums.

In addition, you will have the opportunity to create your own language using linguistic rules. Each week, you will add more complexity to your created language, known as a Conlang culminating in a short, simple story in the new language at the end of the course.
