

PSY552 Criminogenic Psychopathology (3 credit hours) Course Syllabus

Course Description

The course explores the link between psychopathology and criminal behavior. Students in the class will review research on the relationship between psychological disorders and criminal violence. The class explores the various historical trends of forensic views on the role of mental illness on interpersonal and criminal violence.

Course Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, you will be able to:

- 1. Identify and explain the major psychological theoretical perspectives on the origins of aggression and criminal behavior.
- 2. Distinguish between different types of offenders and criminal behavior.
- 3. Apply a variety of psychological explanations as to why and in what contexts criminal behavior occurs.
- 4. Explain mental disorders that are likely to occur with offender populations.
- 5. Analyze the situations and needs of offenders with mental disorders.

Time Commitment

Effective time management is possibly the single most critical element to your academic success. To do well in this online class you should plan your time wisely to maximize your learning through the completion of readings, discussions, and assignments. Because of our accelerated, seven-week term, TU online courses are designed with the expectation that you dedicate a little over **six (6)** hours per credit hour to course activities and preparation **each week**. For example, for successful completion of a three-credit, seven-week online course you should reserve roughly **twenty (20) hours per week**.

To help plan your time and keep on track toward successful course completion, note the distinctive rhythm of assignment due dates:

- 5. Major assignments and reflections are typically due by **11:55 p.m. ET** on **Sundays**. **Please note week 7 the final paper assignment is due by Thursday**.

Learning Activities

- Discussions: Each week we explore the course content through an engaging discussion. We share initial posts and responses based on the weekly readings, personal experiences, and core beliefs. These discussions offer us ample opportunity to engage with each other, share opinions and our research on course-specific topics.
- 2. Assignments & Case Analysis Research: Brief weekly papers set the stage for the comprehensive case analysis research project in week six. Each week we review and research topics presented in the text. These concepts are then supported through an exploration of current research and relevant supplemental videos. The case analysis research project allows us to dissect and apply various elements of criminogenic psychopathology to a specific individual and situation. Our findings are informed by current scientific research, existing legal statutes, and diagnostic standards.
- 3. **Final Synthesis Paper:** In this final assignment, we explore all course content and material and apply it for real world application, examining how the material relates to careers in the field.
