

# GLC755 - Global Leadership Theory and Practice (3 credit hours) Course Syllabus

## **Course Description**

This course offers an in-depth study of problems in operating across multiple political and cultural boundaries. Topics include theory and practice of the international organization, global competition, organizing for global operations, market entry, innovations, and comparative management. This course will feature the theory and practice of global leadership. Students examine current literature about cross-cultural leadership and the conceptual foundations on which it is based. Special emphasis will be placed on understanding globalization and its impact on how leadership is exercised in today's world. This course explores challenges facing modern corporations in organizing cross-border activities. The course draws heavily on current literature in management, economics, and global leadership theory. Emphasis is placed on empirical research.

#### **Course Learning Outcomes**

By the end of this course, you will be able to:

- 1. Describe how emerging and current global leadership theories impact current events.
- 2. Evaluate the effect of global and multicultural leadership practices and their influence on organizational environments.
- 3. After analyzing the latest strategic trends in Globalization 4.0 in the Fourth Industrial Revolution, create a plan to integrate global leadership theory and cross-culture practices within an organization or for a specific group of employees for that trend.
- 4. Design successful teams within global organizations, including virtual environments, by applying global leadership theory.
- 5. Synthesize personal and corporate sustainability practices to mitigate environmental and social risks of organizational operations.
