

# GLC820 - International Leadership Experience (3 credit hours) Course Syllabus

#### **Course Description**

This course offers critical concepts to apply research paradigms, study designs, and methods of inquiry. Student's will formulate and respond to research questions. The course is designed to prepare the student to select valid and defensible research design choices in order to gather and interpret findings.

#### **Course Learning Outcomes**

By the end of this course, you will be able to:

- 1. Acknowledge the importance of publication as an essential part of the international research experience and process.
- 2. Recognize scholars' responsibility to share their knowledge with colleagues in the form of publications.
- 3. Analyze the publication outlets and publication requirements of various international conferences in your field or area of specialization.
- 4. Write a manuscript for submittal to a conference.
- 5. Apply the mechanics of the submission, review, revision, and publication processes.

#### **Time Commitment**

#### **Learning Activities**

The Tiffin University Ph.D. program is intended to prepare you to contribute as an original and creative scholar. For GLC820, you will write a scholarly paper to meet the guidelines for an international conference. You are not required to submit your paper, though we strongly encourage you to do so.

Note that **you will not receive a letter grade for this pass/fail course**. To pass, you need to score an 80% average or higher (800/1000 total points). Graded activities consist of four forum discussions (weeks 1, 2, and 7); two short papers (weeks 1 & 7); individual sections of your final draft (weeks 2-5); and a final paper in Week 6. All assignments include a rubric for clarity, self-assessment, and consistency in grading.
