

COR110 Correctional Strategies

(3 credit hours)
Course Syllabus

Course Description

An in-depth analysis of correctional alternatives available for the treatment of the offender. Students will learn the different goals of corrections and how those relate to policy and practice in corrections. Emphasis will be on the various types of treatment programs available to offenders both inside prisons as well as in community-based settings.

- 1. Identify the 5 goals of corrections
- 2. Know the history of correctional thought.
- 3. Incarceration and sentencing trends.
- Identify evidence-based practices.
- 5. Comprehend the concept and importance of community corrections.

Time Commitment
