

COR245 Probation, Parole and Community Corrections (3 credit hours) Course Syllabus

Course Description

Course is designed to address the two common options to the imprisonment of a convicted offender. Theoretical approaches regarding the philosophical as well as the practical aspects of these alternatives are considered.

Course Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, you will be able to:

- 1. Compare the differences between probation and parole.
- 2. Discuss the evolution of corrections in the United States.
- 3. Identify key roles, and responsibilities of probation and parole officers in the criminal justice setting.
- 4. Analyze the effectiveness of probation and parole supervision and theories.
- 5. Examine options available to offenders through community corrections.

Time Commitment
