

ENF150 Police and Society (3 credit hours) Course Syllabus

Course Description

A study of the various response methodologies available to the patrol officer in assisting the citizen's request for police service. Discusses traffic enforcement from the stop of the violator through traffic accident investigation.

Course Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course:

- 1. Students will be able to explain key concepts in policing foundations.
- 2. Students will be able to identify and define the key components of police field operation.
- 3. Students will be able to identify and describe key contemporary issues in policing.

Time Commitment

Effective time management is possibly the single most critical element to your academic success. Learning Activities

Students will engage in detail discussions about contemporary issues in policing and take a cognitive approach to that which impacts policing yesterday, today and tomorrow. There will be written assignments and a PowerPoint presentation, all designed to analyze policing and some of its core concepts. Students will also engage in position papers where the opportunity to reflect upon certain matters facing policing and the criminal justice system are analyzed.
