

# ENF420 Criminal Interviewing (3 credit hours) Course Syllabus

#### **Course Description**

This course will examine several different interview techniques including the PEACE model, Reid, and kinesics interviewing. This course emphasizes interviewing potential suspects, witnesses, and victims, with respect and dignity. This course will emphasize constitutional mandates including the avoidance of coercion, threats, or promises that cannot be kept. Topics include distinctions between interviewing and interrogation, preparation and the formulation of questions, application of law, videotaping, and distinguishing between truthful and false confessions.

### **Course Learning Outcomes**

By the end of this course, you will be able to:

- 1. Distinguish the differences between interviews and interrogations.
- 2. Explain the process and elements of obtaining information from an interview.
- 3. Evaluate the importance of the interview room and the actions of the interviewer.
- 4. Employ the details of interview preparation.
- 5. Assess behaviors of an interviewee and what they mean.
- 6. Analyze and interpret interrogation law.
- 7. Analyze the importance of videotaping to aid in the scrutiny of allegations made by both the interviewer and the interviewee.
