

FOR105 Victimology (3 credit hours) Course Syllabus

Course Description

This course examines the scientific study of the victims, offender and society. Focus will take place on the victim's relationship with the offender and their experience with the criminal justice system. Starting with historical issues of victimology to contemporary issues, students will gain a powerful insight into the specific areas of violence to include family, workplace, school, sexual harassment. Students will learn about the legal aspects of victim's rights and services along with future predictions on the impact of victimology.

Course Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, you will be able to:

- 1. Discuss trends and theories in victimology from historical events to contemporary issues related to the victim.
- 2. Identify the statistical means of reporting and tracking victimization and how it relates to the criminal justice system.
- 3. Analyze the effects and outcomes of being the victim of a crime and relate it to specific crimes of violence.
- 4. Explain the impact of crimes against persons and how it affects the various populations of society.
- 5. Judge the effectiveness of services afforded to victims of crime.
- 6. Analyze and describe crimes of violence against persons where the victim is both known and unknown by the offender.
- 7. Evaluate the legal processes that victims of crimes must endure and the rights afforded to victims.
- 8. Discuss the various degrees of effectiveness of victim statements and their placement into the legal process.

Tips for Success

 - clearly indicate their grading approach (what they like to see in submitted work as well as what types of errors they tend to penalize more harshly),
 - thoroughly review and evaluate your submissions in a timely manner (in less than 5 days for most assignments), and
 - provide constructive feedback on the strengths and weaknesses of your work with suggestions on how you can improve your performance on future assignments.
- Advocate for your success as a learner and help guide you toward successful completion of the course activities and most importantly, attainment of the course learning outcomes.
