

HCA140 Survey of Healthcare Industry (3 credit hours) Course Syllabus

Course Description

This course includes an overview of the healthcare industry and the important concepts needed to manage in the healthcare field.

Course Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, you will be able to:

- 1. Apply basic healthcare industry concepts.
- 2. Identify the steps in the payment process identifying the differences and intricacies of insurance third party payers.
- 3. Distinguish similarities and differences between primary, secondary and tertiary care.
- 4. Examine the scope history, delivery models and people who provide mental health services, public health, medical technology, pharmaceuticals and research and prevention.
- 5. Identify and define the broad overview of the healthcare industry from a business perspective, the challenges to create and sustain a competitive advantage, and the ethical issues present.

Time Commitment

Effective time management is possibly the single most critical element to your academic success. To do well in this online class you should plan your time wisely to maximize your learning through the completion of readings, discussions, and assignments. Because of our accelerated, seven-week term, TU online courses are designed with the expectation that you dedicate a little over **six** (6) hours per credit hour to course activities and preparation **each week**. For example, for successful completion of a three-credit, seven-week online course you should reserve roughly **twenty** (20) hours per week.

To help plan your time and keep on track toward successful course completion, note the distinctive rhythm of assignment due dates:

- 3. Unless otherwise noted, initial assignments or discussion posts are due by **11:55 p.m. ET** on **Wednesdays.**
- 4. Additional assignments or follow-up discussion posts are due by **11:55 p.m. ET** on **Saturdays**, **and**
- 5. Major assignments and reflections are typically due by 11:55 p.m. ET on Sundays.

Learning Activities

This course will offer you opportunities to engage with your instructor and classmates as you explore key aspects of the healthcare system in the United States. You will participate in discussions, take short quizzes, and work on a final project in four phases.

Key Assessment (Taskstream Submission)

This TU course features a "Key Assessment" that provides you the opportunity to demonstrate your program's core competencies. It also shows how the course fits within the broader curriculum. For this course, Activity 7.2 Final Project Part 4 serves as the key assessment.
