

# HED250 World Cultural Geography (3 credit hours) Course Syllabus

### **Course Description**

This course will expose students to cultural variation around the world. Students will investigate physical features and changes in geographic research, populations, humanenvironment interactions, characteristics of human systems and cultural divisions between regions based on language, religion, social customs, economic systems, and cultural interaction.

#### **Course Learning Outcomes**

By the end of this course, you will be able to:

- 1. Interpret geographic information presented in various visual formats.
- 2. Understand physical features and physical systems.
- 3. Analyze ways human societies modify the physical environment and adapt to environmental change, including the role of technological innovation and development in the creation and solution of environmental problems.
- 4. Apply skills and procedures used in geographic research.
- 5. Demonstrate knowledge of human systems as they pertain to social, religious, economic and political features of world regions.

#### **Time Commitment**

Effective time management is possibly the single most critical element to your academic success. All of these activities are planned around the content standards to prepare students to teach middle to high school level social studies in Ohio.
