

MUS223: Music Appreciation (3 credit hours) Course Syllabus

Course Description

The course focuses on the aesthetics of music, listening skills necessary to fully appreciate music, and the societal and cultural roles that music plays. Various folk and art musical styles will be studied, with attention to their historical evolution and influence on one another.

Course Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, you will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate a clear understanding of the basic elements of music using appropriate vocabulary as it relates to various musical forms.
- 2. Recognize and describe salient features of a musical composition through active listening.
- 3. Recognize various musical styles and genres through listening and discuss the features that make a particular example distinct.
- 4. Infer connections between significant sociological, historical and cultural trends that influenced the development of musical art forms.
- 5. Examine periods of western music history including major composers, stylistic features, and representative works.

Time Commitment

Effective time management is possibly the single most critical element to your academic success. To do well in this online class you should plan your time wisely to maximize your learning through the completion of readings, discussions, and assignments. Because of our

accelerated, seven-week term, TU online courses are designed with the expectation that you dedicate a little over **six (6)** hours per credit hour to course activities and preparation **each week**. For example, for successful completion of a three-credit, seven-week online course you should reserve roughly **twenty (20)** hours per week.

To help plan your time and keep on track toward successful course completion, note the distinctive rhythm of assignment due dates:

- 1. All times assume Eastern Time (GMT-4).
- 2. Weeks begin at 12:00 a.m. ET on Monday and end at 11:55 p.m. ET on Sunday.
- 3. Unless otherwise noted, initial assignments or discussion posts are due by **11:55 p.m. ET** on **Wednesdays.**
- 4. Additional assignments or follow-up discussion posts are due by **11:55 p.m. ET** on **Saturdays, and**
- 5. Major assignments and reflections are typically due by 11:55 p.m. ET on Sundays.

Learning Activities

During each week of the course, there will be one discussion (with an optional secondary post), one 1-page reflection paper, and one 2-3 page essay. Also, there are two additional assignments, one during Week 4, and another during Week 7. These both pertain to the Course Project. The additional Week 4 assignment is an outline for the Course Project, and the additional Week 7 assignment is the Course Project itself.

The Course Project, due in Week 7, consists of a detailed description of a concert that you will attend/view between Weeks 1 and 4, along with an in-depth look at one of the compositions from that concert. Note that the Course Project is worth a significant portion of your final grade.
