

PHI215 Ethics
(3 credit hours)
Course Syllabus

Course Description

This course is a critical examination of various moral and ethical problems from the perspectives of different ethical theories. The emphasis is given to those ethical problems that arise in daily life, especially those that are involved rational decision between conflicting values each of which represents something good in itself in order to do what is right.

Course Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, you will be able to:

1. Acquire basic knowledge, skills, and theoretical tools for identifying practical ethical problems.
2. Recognize and apply basic knowledge and tools to analyze ethical problems.
3. Develop basic skills and tools for evaluating different solutions to ethical problems.

Time Commitment

Effective time management is possibly the single most critical element to your academic success. To do well in this online class you should plan your time wisely to maximize your learning through the completion of readings, discussions, and assignments. Because of our accelerated, seven-week term, TU online courses are designed with the expectation that you dedicate a little over **six (6)** hours per credit hour to course activities and preparation **each**

week. For example, for successful completion of a three-credit, seven-week online course you should reserve roughly **twenty (20) hours per week.**

To help plan your time and keep on track toward successful course completion, note the distinctive rhythm of assignment due dates:

Learning Activities

This course is organized around case studies in discussion, reflections, and projects designed to give you an opportunity to apply the ethical philosophies and your own ethics to real-world situations. Each week, the course's author has provided video lectures, presentations, or other custom materials designed to give an overview of the ethical philosophies discussed in the course. Most weeks, you will complete a three-step discussion forum where you create an initial post, reply to other students' posts, and ultimately respond to replies on your initial post. The idea is to foster robust discussions on ethics with your fellow students. Several times, you will be asked to film a short video to complete a case study analysis or reflect on what you have learned. In week 5, a research paper on a case study of your choosing will help develop research and analysis skills.
