

SOC101 Principles of Sociology (3 credit hours) Course Syllabus

Course Description

Introduction to the basic concepts of sociological study, elements of social life, social patterns and institutions, and the process of maintenance and change in society.

Course Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, you will be able to:

- 1. Gain overall knowledge of the main constructs of sociology.
- Demonstrate how the scientific-humanistic body of knowledge contributes to the discipline.
- 3. Understand the application of major theoretical viewpoints to the content within the discipline.
- 4. Learn to think critically through the use of the "sociological imagination."
- 5. Apply sociological concepts to everyday life.
- Recognize the importance of a diverse society.

Time Commitment

Effective time management is possibly the single most critical element to your academic success. To do well in this online class you should plan your time wisely to maximize your learning through the completion of readings, discussions, and assignments. Because of our accelerated, seven-week term, TU online courses are designed with the expectation that you dedicate a little over **six (6)** hours per credit hour to course activities and preparation **each week**. For example, for successful completion of a three-credit, seven-week online course you should reserve roughly **twenty (20) hours per week**.

To help plan your time and keep on track toward successful course completion, note the distinctive rhythm of assignment due dates:

- 5. Major assignments and reflections are typically due by 11:55 p.m. ET on Sundays.

Learning Activities

In this sociology course, you will engage in various learning activities, including projects, case studies, research papers, and presentations. These activities are designed to closely align with course outcomes, emphasizing high-order cognitive tasks that challenge you to apply, analyze, evaluate, and create solutions based on sociological concepts. For instance, you will complete a "Sociological Autobiography" project, linking your personal history to sociological theories, and a research paper analyzing the impact of gender and racial discrimination. Additionally, you will work on a case study focused on cultural norms and social structures, and a presentation comparing family dynamics, religion, and education. These activities will help you internalize core concepts and skills, providing opportunities to solve or analyze real-world problems. Rubrics and model examples will guide you in understanding the criteria for successful outcomes.
